Very early in sobriety I learned that the reason we celebrate anniversaries is to demonstrate the fact that the program and fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous is a workable, viable solution for millions who suffer from the illness of alcoholism. Yet I still witness to this day that when a person's anniversary is announced the person very often smiles demurely and "humbly" receives the applause.


The question becomes, "Does the person deserve the applause?" Aren't we applauding the fact that the program works? If so, why isn't the celebrant applauding?

When a performer displays some artistic ability and receives applause for it, doesn't the performer take a bow or humbly offer some other form of acknowledgment of the applause? Celebrants, however, are not performers; they are simply very fortunate people who have been given a "pearl of great price".

# The Grapevine in Other Formats

Have you ever wondered what early AAs have said about our singleness of purpose, or what Dr. Bob and Bill W. said about anonymity? Have you ever wanted to look up the origin of the Preamble or read an interview with an author of the Big Book story? Articles like these will soon be easier to get than ever before.

Every Grapevine issue from June, 1944 to the present now has been put into digital form, so that the Fellowship will have access to more than 10,000 articles, letters and cartoons that the Grapevine has published over the last sixty years.

Known as the Digital Preservation and Accessibility Project, this archive will preserve the legacy of the Grapevine and several important chapters in the history of AA. It will also allow the Fellowship to search for articles in a variety of ways. With a text search, readers will be able to type in a word such as "acceptance" and get a wealth of articles on the topic. They will also be able to find articles by departments, such as Around AA or Ham on Wry, and by author, geographic location or issue. Readers who want to browse can scroll through topics to see what the Fellowship has had to say about spirituality, twelfth-stepping, the Concepts, or the history of AA.
