Our first Bulletin was issued in May 1973. It was a two-sided sheet of paper with all sorts of great information. The first officers of our spanking new Intergroup are mentioned: Chairman:Dot P ( Greenlawn-Huntington Station), Co-Chairman Martin F. (Commack), Secretary: Carol C. (St. James) and Treasurer: Ruth C. (Westhampton). Are any of these people still around?

The Exchange meeting was held at Methodist Church Fellowship Hall on the corner of Brooksite and Nesconset Highway in Hauppauge AND it was listed as for both Nassau and Suffolk counties. There were five new groups listed: 1) Guys and Dolls in Selden which had a closed meeting at 9:00pm on Fridays, 2) Lincoln and Lee in Wainscott which listed an "open house" meeting every Monday at 9:00pm, 3) Blue Point which offered two meetings at Our Lady of Snow Church---closed meeting Tuesday at 8:00pm and open meeting 8:30 Saturday, 4) East Setauket with a closed meeting at 9:00pm at the Methodist Church and 5) Live Again which announced an afternoon meeting at 1:00pm at St. Lukes on Wicks Road in Brentwood. It is great to note that all five of these meetings are still going strong after 35 years, although one has moved and several have had time changes.

As you can see these old Bulletins are an incredible source of historical information. If you have been holding on to copies of the old ones, please keep your friendly neighborhood Archives in mind. #### **Tradition XII**

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

Let us always remember that anonymity ~ not taking credit for our own or others' recovery ~ is humility at work.

Anonymity, as we observe it in A.A., is a simple expression of humility. When we use the Twelve Steps to recover from alcoholism, we are *each* trying to achieve real humility, to put our self-respect on a solid base of truth, rather than the fantasies about ourselves. When we use the Twelve Traditions to work together in A.A., we are *all* trying to achieve humility; as individual members, by recognizing our true place in A.A.: as a fellowship, by recognizing A.A.'s true place in the world.

Alcoholics Anonymous Traditions admonish us that to preserve harmony and to enhance the survival value of our movement, we should seriously respect the anonymous aspect of the Program.

Anonymity is a potent reminder that we are just one among many, an infinitesimal agent of a great power. It has a very substantial spiritual significance, reminding us to respect the common welfare of the movement ahead of our own.

Anonymity stymies self-glorification and insures the other fellow the right to preserve his own identity. Who you are in A.A. is not important.

Anonymity protects the movement. If someone in the program suddenly reverts to drinking, as sometimes happens, wraps his/her car around a telephone pole, and makes the news. A.A. is left unscathed.

Anonymity fortifies us against political invasion and alignment with religious or other movements. Former movements have been destroyed by the invasion of political speakers and alignment with various sectarian organizations. By remaining strictly nameless, we bypass these and all controversial issues such as the wet and dry question and other promotional projects.

Anonymity insures us against members forming small groups, associating personal names with the Alcoholics Anonymous name, and obtaining credit, loans or gifts for clubs, furnishings, etc., which dangerous procedure has proved disastrous in some places.

Anonymity discourages members from becoming professionals, charging fees for counseling and other services, and prevents personal publicity in all printed material, photographs, radio and television, etc.

Let us all remember that Alcoholics Anonymous is a spiritual entity only. It has nothing to sell and doesn't want to buy anything. It gives away everything and has more for so doing. A.A. belongs to all alcoholics who have a sincere desire to use its principles. Certainly all of us should feel duty bound to preserve its principles and practices, not only for ourselves, but for all the alcoholics yet to come.
