From the Archives

On December 11, 1934, Bill Wilson bought four bottles of beer which he drank on the way to Towns Hospital. That was the last drinks he would ever have. A few days later on the 14th, in a deep dark depression, Bill cried out in agony for God to reveal himself. It was then that he had this profound spiritual experience. He met with his doctor, Dr. William Silkworth, thinking surely he had lost his mind. But the good Doctor told him that whatever had happened had changed Bill and to stick with it. Bill stuck with it and by the time he discharged from Towns on the 18th he was already carrying the message to drunks in New York. And the message he carried was carried to others who carried it to others right down to us today and we, in turn have the responsibility of carrying it others.

What a wonderful story. Why not help us save the history of Alcoholics Anonymous here in Suffolk County. Contact the Archives Committee today. One of the stories you help save today could very well help save someone's life someday...maybe yours. Have a blessed, sober holiday.

Concept XII

General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decisions be reached by discussion vote and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or as an incitement to public controversy; that though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and actions.

This is important stuff. We won't be ruled or governed by our conference, we'll be responsible with our money, we won't have any "bosses", decisions will be made by discussion and vote, we'll keep to ourselves concerning outside issues and we'll remain democratic and treat each other with love and respect.

"No penalties to be inflicted for nonconformity to A.A. principals; no fees or dues to be levied – voluntary contributions only; no member to be expelled from A.A. – membership to always be the choice of the individual; each A.A. group to conduct it's internal affairs as it wishes – it being merely requested to abstain from acts that might injure A.A. as a whole; and finally that any group of alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an A.A. group provided that, as a group, they have no other purpose or affiliation." **

What we're talking about here are the enormous freedoms we have as a society. Great lengths were taken to ensure the freedom and voice of all members through this concept. A lot of members refer to the Traditions as "rules' by which the groups survive but when we spell them out as in the paragraph above, we see that in reality, they are the great freedoms given to us to survive.

"The sum of these several attitudes and practices is, in our view, the very essence of democracy – in action and spirit. Freedom under God to grow in His likeness and image will ever be the quest of Alcoholics Anonymous. May our General Service Conference be always seen as a chief symbol of this cherished liberty. To a man, we of A.A. believe that our freedom to serve is truly the freedom by which we live – the freedom in which we have our being." **
