From the Archives

East Hampton Group

One of the pioneer groups in Suffolk County, this meeting began in August of 1948 in the Methodist Church Hall of East Hampton, also known as the Session House of the Methodist Church. A letter written to the New York Alcoholic Foundation dated August 16, 1948 by group secretary, Elizabeth, stated that the group had 10 members. At that time the only other option for alcoholics on the east end of Long Island was the Southampton Group.

Sometime between 1948 and 1955, the group moved to St. Luke's Church Center, 18 James Lane-off Main-Town Rd. There is no record of date they moved. Jed, one of us, remembers going to this meeting in 1955. He said about 15 older people were there; he was in his twenties at that time.

An A.A. named John went to this meeting in 1968 when only this meeting existed at that time. John was back there in 1970 or 1971 and the 8:00 p.m. Beginner's Meeting had started.

From this 9:00 p.m. Open Meeting, the group grew to: a 7:45 p.m. Beginner's Meeting (it started as an 8:00 p.m. meeting sometime between 1968 and 1971); a 7:45 p.m. Beginner's Baby Room Meeting started July 1981; and an 8:00 p.m. Thursday Step Meeting sometime before August 1973. The 12:00 noon Friday Closed Discussion Meeting came into being; no date is known at this time.

All the meetings had to move out when the St. Luke's Center was being torn down. All moved to the East End Church of Christ 500 Sag Harbor Turnpike, East Hampton in September 2007.

The original 9:00 p.m. Open Meeting has for years suffered from lack of attendance with only 2-6 people showing up and has closed down as of November 2007 but leaving us a legacy of 4 other meetings.

The Beginner's Baby Room

This group was started in 1981 by Kate P. and Tony P. It meets at 7:45 p.m. on Tuesday. One of the first speakers was Phil G. It began because the Beginner's Meeting became overcrowded with over 80 people.

This meeting was supposed to have originally started back, probably, in the early 1950's, which is still being researched. The 9:00 p.m. Open Meeting just after the Beginner's Meeting goes back to 1948 which was started in the Methodist Church in East Hampton. This meeting then moved to St. Luke's sometime in the early 1950's.

This is a unique meeting. In 1981, the original Beginner's Meeting became so overcrowded that it outgrew the large room where it was housed. A second Beginner's Meeting was created called the Baby Room. This meeting would have a chairman and a speaker, but only beginners, under one year, were allowed to attend. Once you had one year of sobriety you were not allowed to return to that room unless you are invited to speak or became chairman of the group.

When I was given the gift of sobriety in 1987, I heard about the Baby Room. The rumor was that if you attended this meeting the averages were above normal for a successful recovery. This room was having a higher survival rate than other meetings. I attended every Tuesday during my first year of sobriety. It was above the main Beginner's meeting, in a 15 by 20 ft. room. When I was there it was always packed and crowded; in the summer it was a sweat box but I continued to go.

To date, this meeting room is found only by word of mouth; it is not listed in the schedule as a second Beginner's Meeting at that location.

March-May 1938 – Bill begins the book Alcoholics Anonymous. Works Publishing Inc. established to support writing and printing of the book.

March 1941 – 1st Prison AA Group formed at San Quentin.

March 1, 1941 – Jack Alexander's Saturday Evening Post article was published.

March 10, 1944 – New York Intergroup was established.

March 31, 1947 – 1st AA group formed in London, England.

March 22, 1951 – Dr. William Duncan Silkworth dies at Towns Hospital.

March 21, 1966 – Ebby dies.

March 22, 1984 – Clarence S., "Home Brewmeister", dies.
