Here are just a few interesting facts about Alcoholics Anonymous that happened throughout history during the month of July:

1939, July 4 – First A.A. meeting started in Flatbush, New York.

1943, July 24 – L.A. press reports formation of all-Mexican A.A. Group.

1940, July 8 – First A.A. Group formed in Dayton, Ohio.

1940, July 23 – Philly AA's send 10% of kitty to Alcoholic Foundation, sets precedent.

1941, July 20 – First A.A. group formed in Seattle, Washington.

1950, July 28-30 – First A.A. International Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio. Twelve Traditions adopted. Dr. Bob made last appearance at large A.A. gathering.

1965, July 2 – "Best of Bill" and Pocket-Sized "12 and 12" first sold.

1965, July 2-4 – 30th Anniversary of A.A. in Toronto. Adopted "I Am Responsible."

1975, July 4-6 – 40^{th} Anniversary of A.A. in Denver, Colorado. World's largest coffee server serves $\frac{1}{2}$ million cups a day.

1980, July 3-6 – Gay AA's have own program at 40th A.A. Anniversary in New Orleans.

1993, July 2 – 50 years of A.A. celebrated in Canada.

Wyandanch Group

Our Lady of Miraculous Medal Church Parish Hall 1434 Straight Path

In 1953, Joe M., Joe G., and Leo D. left the Amityville Group. Their goal was to start a new meeting on a different night than the Amityville Group met. Clint F., who came into A.A. in 1948, would lead the first closed meeting in the new group. Jim C., who sobered up in 1970, remembers taking Leo D.'s groceries to his car in the late 1960's. Jim worked in Wyandanch and was in the heyday of his own drinking; much done in Wyandanch.

The group began to grow. It is interesting to note that black A.A. members were scarce in Suffolk County. Wyandanch had a diverse community. In the 1970's, the group consisted of mostly white alcoholics. Jim C. noted this and wondered where all the black alcoholics were. After all, he had seen many blacks drinking while he worked at the grocery store near the tracks on Straight Path.

Well, today the group is made up of mostly black members. Their Sunday night closed meeting still meets. Their Beginners meeting is held on Wednesday at 7:00pm. Their open meeting used to meet on Wednesdays at 9pm, but now meets on Fridays at 7pm. Group Anniversaries include food and dancing.

Joe S. Remembers

I called Joe S, a long time member of the Wyandanch Group, who is currently residing in Largo, Florida, to talk about his years in A.A. He first learned of A.A. in 1961 through another alcoholic and started going to meetings, but didn't believe he was one of "us". He came around for 3 or 4 years, but stayed "on the fringe" sitting in the back, not getting involved, and had several relapses. During that time, he went to meetings in Lindenhurst, Wyandanch and Babylon. He said that Willie Mae started the Babylon meeting in the kitchen of her home. During Christmas of 1963, he had a bad accident (he was a black-out drinker) and finally surrendered and called for help. Doug, Danny and Andy of the Wyandanch Group 12-stepped him and took him to Freeport Hospital for B12 shots. They also took him to meetings. By the grace of God, Joe had his last drink on May 4, 1964 and Doug became his sponsor for the first ten years of his sobriety.

Family members were encouraged to attend Open A.A. meetings and the Wyandanch Group had 35-40 group members at that time. He purchased his first Big Book early in sobriety, but ended up giving it away to another in need. Joe said 12-stepping was big in A.A. in his early years and he often made 3 or 4 calls a week. He had brought prospects to his home, but his wife frowned upon that practice after putting up with him for years. For the most part they made house calls to the prospects, staying with them in shifts, day and night. Some they took to hospitals, but made sure they got to meetings. He misses the 12 step work because it helped him to remember the past.

When Joe started in A.A., he felt that the Traditions were followed more to the letter and had more importance than they do today. He explained that all were welcome at meetings as long as they had a desire to stop drinking, but only problems relating to alcohol were allowed to be discussed at meetings. Joe also said there were no Open Discussion meetings in the early days. For the most part, "how not to drink today" was discussed at meetings. Joe's advice to a newcomer is basic - get a sponsor, home group, and commitment - share and tell your story. Joe feels that God and A.A. saved his life. He still sponsors A.A. members.

We also discussed alcoholism as a disease and Joe remembers that in 1967 or 1968 the AMA recognized it as a disease.

Opportunities for some 12th step work: I Am Responsible... When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of A.A. always to be there. And for that: I am responsible.

"An AA group, as such, cannot take on all the personal problems of its members, let alone those of nonalcoholics in the world around us. The AA group is not, for example, a mediator of domestic relations, nor does it furnish personal financial aid to anyone. Though a member may sometimes be helped in such matters by his friends in AA, the primary responsibility for the solutions of all his problems of living and growing rests squarely upon the individual himself. Should the AA group attempt this sort of help, its effectiveness and energies would be hopelessly dissipated. This is why sobriety - freedom from alcohol - through the teaching and practice of AA's 12 Steps, is the sole purpose of the group. If we don't stick to this cardinal principle, we shall almost certainly collapse. And if we collapse we cannot help anyone."
