On Easter Sunday 2010, I took on the Hotline commitment for the very first time. It was a rewarding experience throughout the day, but on my way to my home group (Home For Dinner) in Deer Park, I truly experienced what it is to be a part of Alcoholics Anonymous. I'm still not sure why I choose Easter Sunday for my day to do the Hotline, but today I believe it was God choosing this day for me. I was almost at my meeting when I received a call. It was Tim on the other end. He needed help. He was at the train station and not in very good shape. I told him to stay on the line with me. I immediately felt drawn to Tim. I felt his pain as he spoke. He reminded me of me. I kept talking with him and pulled in front of the church where the meeting was to be held. I ran inside and grabbed James and Eddie and gave them my cell phone and we told Tim we were on our way. Sit tight. We are coming.

I turned around as the meeting was going on, and there I saw Tim. Shaken and saddened, frightened and worried, but then he shared. He was willing to give this a shot. He needed help and couldn't do this alone. We stayed with him, got him some warm food, and then brought him to a place where he could get help.

I met Tim a little time later for the first time, face to face. I have never felt such a warm feeling overcome me as we hugged so tightly. I will never forget that feeling, to feel so connected to someone who I didn't even know. I felt blessed to be on the phone that day that he called for help. God gave me the strength that day for me to be able to help Tim. I speak to him often and he has just celebrated his 90 days of Sobriety. He has seen how A.A. has helped his life and in turn, I have been taught the same. Our Lives become a little more manageable "One Day At a Time". As for myself, "My name is Carolyn and I am an Alcoholic who has received a precious gift.....His name is Tim."

Step Nine – Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

Tradition Nine – A.A., as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.

Concept IX – Good service leadership at all levels is indispensable for our future functioning and safety. Primary world service leadership, once exercised by the founders, must necessarily be assumed by the trustees.

1930, September – Bill wrote 4th (last) promise in family Bible to quit drinking.

1937, September 13 - Florence R. was the first female in A.A. in N.Y.

1939. September 1 – Earl T. started first the A.A. group in Chicago, Illinois.

1940, September – First A.A. group was started in Toledo, Ohio by Duke P. and others.

1946, September – First A.A. group in Mexico was formed.

1949, September – 1st issue of Grapevine was published in "pocketbook" size.

1975, September 19 – Jack Alexander, author of original Saturday Evening Post article, dies.

2001, September 11 – 30 Vesey St, New York, (the location of A.A.'s first office) is destroyed during the World Trade Center attack.

East Northport Valley 8 PM, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, 106 Vernon Valley Road, East Northport, NY

The East Northport Valley Eight O'Clock Group was started in May 1972 because a group of people from the Kings Park Group wanted a meeting in the East Northport at 8:00 PM. Original members were Virginia S., Artie M. and Becky K. Around 1973 the beginner's meeting was on Saturday. The step meeting was on Thursday. Eventually the beginner's meeting moved to Thursday before the 8:00 PM step meeting and a closed discussion meeting at 8:00 PM. Saturday night became the open meeting.

The first founders bought a 100 cup coffee pot. For weeks hardly anyone came. People began to trickle in. No one had long-term sobriety. Most had a year or two. Newcomers were told not to come because there wasn't much sobriety. Caroline H. says in 1973 there were about 12 members. The Valley meeting was the only one to meet at 8:00 PM at that time. All other meeting started at 9:00 PM. Membership picked up during the 1970s. By this time, parents brought their kids and watched them in the back room. Daycare was here!

In the 80's the Saturday night meeting would bring in 200 people. Young people came to socialize. In the mid-80's issues arose including non-smoking, and too much socializing and these issues cut the membership in half.

Just after Christmas Day 1985, a well loved spiritual member John H., "John the Baptist", collapsed and died during a Thursday night meeting. He uttered the words, "I feel a touch of eternity", before he fell. The Valley was left with small numbers, but stronger than ever. The group began to grow again. We continue to carry the message in the same church. We had a baby shower and a wedding shower for Simone and Lance after two Saturday night meetings. Jim K. proposed to his wife during his anniversary on a Saturday night. Jim C. was taken out of a meeting by a member in 1981 with anxiety.

Eventually the kids and their playing left the back room because they made a new room. Our main room has become smaller over the last 15 years due to school needs. Bright artwork adorns the room during the school year. In the late 80s, the entry was switched from the front door to the side door.

There are two funny stories. Steve T. was drinking and tried to drive his car up the front steps, breaking them. He also cooked a steak dinner during the meeting. Frank V. punched a drunk who wouldn't stop harassing him.

Sometimes we are meeting in the auditorium basement when we can't use the other building. Our group anniversaries have moved to the auditorium basement due to less room in the meeting building. Members form camping trips. We are also known for dining out after meetings!
