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GOODBYE TO SELF PITY

The fifth promise of Alcoholics Anonymous suggests, "That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will disappear." Prior to recovery my attitude was, "Why am I who give so much and ask so little treated so shabbily?" I was drowning in self-pity.

Being raised in the south Bronx as one of ten kids, I suppose it's true that I've played the role of victim for a good portion of my life. I hated being poor and felt the world was depriving me of my rightful title and position in society.

It never occurred to me that if we believe something strongly enough it actually becomes a reality. An often quoted Shakespearean axiom is "There is nothing either good or bad but thinking makes it so."

There's an ancient story of a monk being chased by a tiger and he found himself at the edge of a cliff. There was a vine hanging over the cliff and he hastened to lower himself on the vine to escape the tiger. As he was descending, he saw another tiger waiting for him at the bottom of the cliff. Looking up, he noticed a rat chewing at the vine.

At that very instant he noticed a wild strawberry growing out of the side of the cliff. He plucked it and enjoyed the best tasting strawberry he had ever had in his life.

It's only a story, of course, but there is a message in it for me. That monk may very well have been in the final moments of his life and he still knew enough to get the best out of the present moment.

Metaphorically speaking, life continually sends me tigers but life also sends me strawberries. I hadn't been able to enjoy the strawberries because I had always been too damned worried about the tigers. I make better choices today and I'm grateful for the awareness that attitude is vitally important as we face the various vicissitudes of life.

I remember feeling afraid as a kid and thinking that the mere presence of fear within me made me a coward. I didn't realize that one of the definitions of courage is the willingness to do the right thing in spite of fear.

When I stray from the light of reason that AA so freely offers me, I am still capable of falling back into the morass of uselessness and self-pity but on this particular day, at least, I will not turn my back on AA.

Group History



Bridgehampton East End Young People Queen of the Most Holy Rosary 2350 Montauk Hwy., Bridgehampton

A phone call with group member Phillip provided the information for this group. He credited Christine and Steve as being the "catalysts" for getting this meeting off the ground. The two co-founders still attend on occasion.

Phillip, who is now 2 1/2 years sober, spoke glowingly of A.A. and his recovery. "I started over". He is currently living in Sag Harbor. He attends school now in Manhattan but believes in one of the basic tenets of Alcoholics Anonymous - giving back. "I do a whole lot of service". He is a General Services Representative.

EEYP meets every Thursday with the following format:

First Thursday - Speaker Meeting.

Second Thursday - Step Meeting,

Third Thursday - Speaker Meeting

Last Thursday - Living Sober.

The group celebrated its first anniversary on November 11, 2003. It was in existence for about one year before it made its appearance on the meeting list. "It's a young people's meeting but we keep the doors open to anyone." Phillip estimated that 90% of those in attendance are under thirty years of age and of the others, a good percentage are people who had gotten sober young themselves.

In its year and a half, "lots of people have come through the doors, kids who had gotten in trouble or were encouraged to check it out by their parents who are also in recovery". Most don't return but they have been given a positive introduction to A.A. and more importantly have seen that they could get sober while still young. Phillip emphasized that this young people's meeting is not "a social thing". There is serious recovery and the focus is on the steps.

As is true of many East End meetings, attendance dwindles over the winter season. This past winter, Phillip said at many meetings "I was the only one there" but he persevered. Now with school out and the summer crowd out in force, the attendance averages between ten and twenty people each week

GATHER THE ROSE OF LOVE

"Since defective relations with other human beings have nearly always been the immediate cause of our woes, including our alcoholism, no field of investigation could yield more satisfying and valuable rewards than this one."

This statement from the "Twelve and Twelve" is a poignant one since few places in our literature speak of explicit causes of alcoholism. Many years ago, when still drinking, I stood at my father's coffin and whispered to him, "If you had given me what I needed when you were alive, I might be able to feel something now but as it stands I have nothing to give." I believed at the time that my father had never loved me. It never occurred to me, however, that I was still free to love him. I failed in that responsibility.

For a long time, the one regret I had in sobriety was that I hadn't been aware of my responsibility to love and had been refusing to love my father. Throughout my life it seems as though I'd been squeezing the world by the throat trying to make it love me, not realizing I first had to become a loving person in order to attract love into my life.

In my early sobriety I saw an image on the bulletin board of a local rehab; it was a bottle of booze complete with skull and crossbones under which a caption read: "It's ironic that you should have embraced me when you were seeking love, for I have not one drop of compassion for you."

I was sober a few years when it occurred to me that I had never embraced my sons, who were man-sized at the time. My wife helped me through this awkwardness by suggesting we should have a "family hug night" one night a week. My sons and I had admitted feeling a bit awkward the first time we embraced but afterward we all agreed we felt liberated. We no longer experience awkwardness when embracing each other. We feel only love. Love is the way.

My father's name was on my Eighth Step list and about a year and a half after I'd made the list he came to me in a dream. In the dream I asked his forgiveness because I was not the son I might have been because of my alcoholism.

My father forgave me. Perhaps a dream therapist or a psychiatrist or some other scientifically-minded person might suggest the dream was unreal. Actually though I don't care what anyone thinks about it. I know the relationship with my father has been healed. We are reminded in the St. Francis Prayer that it is better to love than to be loved.

Poet Edmond Spencer poignantly suggested, "Gather the rose of love whilst yet is time."

The one, most indelible impression anyone has of the Huntington Group, is of their experience upon entering our Home Group...One would have to walk around to the back of the church, down a set of stairs, above which was a light so bright, like a beacon illuminating the darkness and through a door (that if not held while closing, would slam so profoundly loud that all sense of stealth would be lost). And there, a LONG hallway, which seemed miles long, would be at your feet. As one trudges down this hallway, with a most noticeable downward slope, one begins to realize just how undeniably low drinking has brought them. Feeling the weight of each step, the echoes of laughter and people talking would reverberate and get louder as you would get closer and closer to the meeting....Finally, after journeying down this hallway, a feeling of wanting to turn around and run would be met by one of our humble giants, "Eddie the Cat", a short black gentleman wearing a beret and a big smile so wide and white, would welcome you to the Huntington group, with a sincerity and serenity that would soothe any troubled soul.

It was then, the feeling of isolation was whisked away as a sense of belonging was realized. As you would walk into the meeting, with smoke so thick, you could hardly see the other side of the room, you would be greeted by strangers who turned out to be "good friends" you hadn't yet met, with a sincerity few newcomers ever knew and an understanding few ever had. As a sense of relief filled the smoke filled air, another of our humble giants, "Black Mary" aka: Mary U., would come over and size you up in an instant – she would warmly shake your hand and welcome you. But! If anyone tried to give her any B/S, she'd then be toe to toe with you and tell you to "take the cotton out of your ears and stick it in your mouth, sit down and get stupid and if you were stupid, to get stupid-O". Mary had a heart of gold and all the time in the world for you, but no time for any B/S. Tough Love permeated the rooms then. There were also other likeminded humble giants in our midst, Clint F., Ed C., Sam R., Bob W., Joan W., Tom "the Butcher", Jimmy and Dick S., Polly F., Charlie N. and Cass (R.I.P.). Also Harry M., Dot W., Jack K., Phil C., Dianne T., Charlie Z., Tim W., Carrie N., Inge S., Carl and Dave....Nowhere else could you find such a consortium of characters with colors so different, vivid and vibrant, yet united in a unique Spirit of Fellowship that knew no bounds, as we all together, "Trudge the Road of Happy Destiny".

Our group, like all AA groups, were busy following the 12 Steps and 12 Traditions with the goal of helping another alcoholic achieve sobriety. There were many problems solved by group conscience. Many members gave outstanding service to the group, extending themselves to both individual members and to the Huntington group. Devotion to the Principles of AA is the reason our Group is still in existence.

- 1940 "The First Group" of AA's meet in Huntington and possibly earlier. They would meet in members homes, hence the term "Home Group" was born. Letter from Bill Wilson -Thanking members for their service.
- 1941 August 7 "PROBLEM DRINKERS START CHAPTER OF ORGANIZATION HERE. Known as Alcoholics Anonymous Perhaps the strangest organization in history, with membership drawn from all walks of life in the bonds of a common slavery, is establishing a chapter in Huntington, with PO Box 444 for discreet communications." (Long Islander News)
- 1941 Sept. 25 Members of Huntington AA address Huntington Welfare Forum. Educating the forum about how the AA program works through its members to help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.
- Date Unknown Suffolk County Group of Huntington Disbands Due To War(WWII).
- 1945 March 1 Alcoholic Anonymous Reorganizing in Huntington, Bid Liquor Addicts to Join the Group (L.I. News)
- 1946 January 9 Wednesday, Suffolk Alcoholics Anonymous Unit Holding First Meet in South Side Civic Association, 1925 NY Ave. at 8:30pm. (Meetings became too big for meetings in members homes.) (L.I. News)
- 1947 January 3 Letter From Bill Wilson: Congratulating the Huntington Group on Anniversary (SIA Archives)
- 1960 June 22 Huntington Group warmly welcomed to meet at Old First Pres. Church, for a "6 month Probationary Period". (Perhaps the church had No Idea as to what to expect, with a bunch of Alcoholics in their basement?)
