All the chairs were lined up nicely and color coordinated. 12 and 12 shades hung up for all to see. No guesswork at all where the meeting is located in the church. Laminated signs are on the front door as well as in the hall steering one and all downstairs. In fact all printed material is laminated. This group is designed to last a long time.

The format is brand new out here, based upon one found in California and New York City and is truly bucking a trend in Suffolk County. In the last 15 years, most open meetings have given way to open discussion meetings. Not here; there is no discussion, sharing or feedback. This Tuesday 7:30 p.m. meeting is designed for listening. Several people are picked to share their Alcoholics Anonymous message. One after another they stand in front of the room sharing. Unlike other timed meetings in the area, there are no buzzers or time clocks to remind errant speakers. The chairperson is the timekeeper. He holds up one sign giving a gentle one minute warning. The other sign says, "Thank you for sharing". That translates into "times up". Needless to say, both signs are laminated.

The first meeting was held on March 6, 2018 and a very impressive 21 people showed up. An adorable tyke named Holden and an extremely cooperative baby were also along for the special occasion. Add a delicious homemade cake and a wonderful main speaker, (Maddie from Centerport Unity) and here are all the makings of a great start for a group. Every month people will celebrate "birthdays", another difference from the usual term "anniversaries" Here's wishing many future sober birthdays to all. Welcome

Gratitude


What began as a list has blossomed to life, Where a goal once was, a daily hike. Where fear owned time, and our rights Lies the calm release of being all right.

MOTIVE - DOES IT MATTER? By Ed H.

On action alone be thy interest; never on its fruits, Let not the fruits of action be thy motive...

Bhagavad Gita

The ancient Hindu text Bhagavad Gita translates from Sanskrit as "Song of the Blessed One." It is being suggested in the quote above that it is best if we focus on doing what is right and that we not concern ourselves with the outcome of our action.

If the message is that we are to maintain a pure motive, that may not always be possible. I sometimes yield to the prompting of "What's in it for me?"

I'm thinking now of the movie Groundhog Day with Bill Murray. At the outset of the movie he had clearly demonstrated his selfish motives. What he wanted most was the sexual conquest of a female fellow worker. He seemed selfishly motivated in all his actions; even his piano playing was strictly for self-aggrandizement.

A phenomenon occurs in the movie that forces him to relive over and over again one particular day - Groundhog Day - repeatedly without letup. Each morning he awakens in the same place at the same time and it is always Groundhog Day.

With every reliving of the day, however, something spiritual is happening to him. Each new day he saves the same child from falling out of the same tree. Throughout the film he is continually becoming more and more centered on life and less and less centered on self.

He now finds that he is playing the piano for the listening pleasure of others rather than for his own importance. He seems to be unaware that he is freeing himself from the repeating patterns of his personality that he had always had prior to Groundhog Day.

It must have been a very wise person who suggested "Being human is difficult. Becoming human is a lifelong process. To be truly human is a gift."

"Principles before personalities" is something we often hear in program. It prompts me to check my motive before taking action.

Concern for self is a legitimate pursuit, however, provided it does not become selfishness. Constantly maintaining unselfish motives is not easy but it is well worth the effort.




Around the AA Campus
