

#### Spotlight on the SIA Third Legacy Committee

But what about going back before we got sober and had to hear about AA and find out where those meetings were? That all gets done by Intergroup, which is the real network that sends speakers to the jails, detoxes, and rehabs where the still sick and suffering are. Those volunteers who answer the hotline speak to that other alcoholic and understand how to get the help they need.

Suffolk County has over 300 groups yet less than a third have an SIA representative. That means twothirds of our members are available to get involved and give back what has been so freely given to them. Yes, each group is autonomous, but Intergroup is the fabric that keeps us all together.

Third Legacy's mission is to reach out to those groups and let them know how much Intergroup needs their help with the other committees. This means I go to so many more meetings and get to meet so many more people. I have been involved with Intergroup since my first sober year and I have learned so much from those with great sobriety. I owe AA my life and am happy to always have a "job" here. #### Free Indeed Word of Truth Church 208 Jamaica Avenue Medford, NY 11763

In addition to his two years of sobriety, Benny C also possesses a very strong faith. For quite a while, he had harbored an equally strong desire to start an AA meeting. The meeting he had planned would "bring the glory of God back into the rooms." To help bring this vision to reality, Benny's pastor opened the doors to Word of Truth Church and allowed the new group use of a room every Saturday at 9:00 AM. This building is no stranger to Alcoholics Anonymous. It once was home to St. Mark's Episcopal Church and over the years three other AA meetings also met here. St. Marks shut down in 2018 and with it the last AA meeting held there came to an end too. For more than two years the building went unsold until another church purchased it and made it its new home.

The inspiration for the meeting's name is from the biblical passage "If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." (John 8:36). The format is open discussion; speaker followed by others sharing. Everyone sits around a long table. The atmosphere is relaxed as one of the Archives Committee members discovered when he attended the first meeting on August 14, 2021. Benny was the first speaker - the person he asked to do that job was unable to attend. He shared his powerful message. Many related a strong identification. An added bonus was the cannolis Benny brought for us all to munch on. Not many of us could recall enjoying these delicious morsels at such an early hour, but quickly were able to overcome any resistance we might have had.

Some of those who attended that first meeting are part of the Word of Truth congregation. They had found an answer to their alcoholism at the church. Now they were looking to add AA to their recovery program. All thanks to Benny, whose own recovery and message of hope inspired them to check it out.



They were now seated at the table too. One person who popped in had been checking out the meeting app on his cellphone. He never recalled a listing for a meeting in Medford probably because it was only just listed - and rode his bicycle over. Little did he realize, when he got there, that he would encounter others he knew. Eight showed up in total, which made for a memorable beginning. At subsequent meetings, some ladies from a local sober house made an appearance. On another Saturday only Benny showed up. Such is the way of new meetings. It takes time for the word to spread.

Benny has a long history of AA service work. He and his wife ran AA marathon meetings at St. Paul's church in Patchogue during the holidays. He long pondered starting a meeting but managed to keep talking himself out of doing so. When his church moved to its new location, and with the support of his pastor, that dream came true. When Benny shared his story and looked around with tears in his eyes, he said "There are miracles happening here."

Wiser words were never spoken.

#### **JUST A PHONE CALL AWAY**

You wake up one morning after one of your alcoholic benders. You have been drinking now for ten days straight and you just cannot stop, but physically, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually you are spent. You have had many bottoms, but you have had enough. You reached the point where "one drink is too much, but a thousand isn't enough". Heard that saying before? You keep drinking to get to the place where it first got you in the beginning of your drinking. Now you can't even get drunk. You keep on drinking more and more to get the desired results. Your whole existence is one monstrous blackout. You have reached bottom. No one wants anything to do with you anymore. All your family and friends have distanced themselves from you. They might have strongly suggested to go to an AA meeting, and you don't know what to expect. For all you know there are a bunch of old men surrounded around the coffee pot smoking cigars and reminiscing about their drinking days.

You reached the point of desperation, when you wake up and stare in the mirror and don't recognize the face looking back at you. So what can you do? You google AA on your phone and you come upon the number for the hotline in your designated area. You might ponder about calling it, afraid they would come to your house and whisk you away and lock you up in some asylum and throw away the key. You take the risk anyway and call. You are desperate. You can't remember what you did last night. You only have half a bottle of poison left. You surrendered and do not want to ever drink again. You say that all the time, but you are now ready to do whatever it takes. Help is just a phone call away, and you pick up that phone that feels like a brick and dial the hotline phone number.

"Hello, this is Zoie from the hotline, how can I help you?" You don't know what to say. You pause for a second but the woman on the other line is still there. "Hello," she says again with a gentle and patient tone, and compelled to talk to her. You promised yourself you would do anything, so you spill your guts out to her and she listens, being courteous and patient. She asks you if you have ever been to an AA meeting or if you need detox. She asks you how much you have been drinking and for how long, in case you are in need of medical help, but you plead with her, suggesting that you will try going to this AA thing, what you call it, and if she can kindly find you a meeting. She asks you where you live so she can find you a meeting closest to you. The meetings are now re-opening. It is two years since the lock-down, so she asks you if you want to go in-person or on zoom. You tell her definitely not on zoom, as your hands tremble in need of a drink and you tell her you have half a bottle of whiskey in the house. She suggests you throw it down the toilet while you are on the phone with her, unless you need it if you are detoxing badly, but you go grab the bottle and flush it down the toilet. You took step one. You surrendered and with another person on the other line. A stranger, but yet a friend. She instantaneously finds you a meeting. It is ten in the morning and there is a meeting at noon and you have to travel fifteen minutes away. There is also a meeting that evening around the corner from your house and since you are unemployed at the time, she suggests you go to both. She tells you what to



You finish talking and decide to get ready for the noon meeting even though you have a massive headache and regret flushing all that whiskey down the drain. Your hands can't stop shaking, but you think of Zoie and she told you how she did it, and how she is now helping others and what she shared with you, and if she did it, just maybe you have a shot at staying sober. You begrudgingly get dressed and drive to the meeting, although she suggests you get a ride because you drank a few hours ago, and you walk in the door, and a year passed and you are celebrating a year

already.

A year later, you call the hotline hoping Zoie answers to express your gratitude to her, because if it was not for her picking up the phone on that September, bleak and darkest day of your life, you would probably be dead the way you were drinking. You are filled with gratitude. If anyone told you a year ago that AA would become the most important thing in your life, you would tell them they were crazy, but yet Zoie was the messenger, and if it was not for her assuring you that AA is not so bad, you would never have gone to the meeting. Well actually she told you there was good cookies and the coffee is the

best she ever tasted. You have to argue on that with her. But you are not complaining.
You figured you would give it a shot and see if she would be on the hotline today. This time you
don't even have to ponder to make the call. "Hello, this is Zoie, how can I help you? That was your
Higher Power working. It was what I would call a God Wing moment. You thank her and invite her to
your year anniversary and she comes. You owe your life to her and you tell her that. And, she states at that it

happened the moment that made you pick up the phone to call me. I was just the messenger. It could have been anyone on the other line. You surrendered, that is why you are sober today. You were honest, open and willing.

That spells HOW, and it is how the program works"

This a true story of how the hotline works. You don't always get to witness a new comer who calls the hotline get and who stays sober, but it is the moments like these ones that are most rewarding, and you'll miss them if you aren't on the other line when someone calls you.
