

By the Book The Local Church 1070 Portion Road Farmingville, NY 11738

Debbie had given much thought to starting an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting. She is a firm believer in the power of the *Big Book* message, so she knew that would be the meeting's focus. She had recovered through this power and wished to share these words with others. The big question was where to locate it. Her spiritual teacher lived in Riverhead

and the preponderance of sober houses in that town made it an ideal location for a *Big Book* meeting. Those new to AA need exposure to our message of recovery.

When her spiritual teacher passed away, Debbie didn't allow that loss to deter her at all. She simply shifted gears and decided to move the meeting closer to where she lived. That turned out to be a bit more difficult than she anticipated. With the pandemic still looming, few churches were open to the idea of allowing AA use of their facility. She contacted over 20 churches in the immediate area. Many churches didn't even respond. Debbie was undaunted. She knew this was going to happen and sometimes that takes time.

Finally, the Local Church was willing. A
Narcotics Anonymous meeting already meets
there, so they are no strangers to 12 Step groups.
Debbie met with the pastor and a very flexible
payment arrangement was set up. The pastor is
well aware this is a new meeting and funds may
be low in the beginning. However, the meeting
would be responsible for paying its own
insurance.



The first meeting was held on Tuesday, March 15, 2022. Fifteen people showed up—including someone brand new to AA. This was her very first meeting! Many in attendance were from a women's sober house. Two representatives of the Intergroup Archives Committee showed up to support the new kid in town. It was a great meeting. No doubt the first in a long line of great meetings.

The format is straight-forward. A paragraph or two from our basic text is read and then comments are shared. This continues until the hour is over. Nothing could be simpler. Start at 7:00 PM and over by 8:00 PM. Coffee is available.

One concern seems to be how to arrange the chairs. Since, Debbie envisions a steady stream of AAs eager to learn about our program of recovery, the seating will be set up in a large circle. That, of course, is subject to change.

When you plan on starting a meeting in Riverhead and end up having it 22 miles away, change is a way of life for you. What will not change is the focus of the meeting. That's not going to happen. The name By the Book says it all.

When I look back to the period of time, a little more than two years ago, when the COVID-19 pandemic began, I can distinctly remember the visceral feelings of anxiety, fear, uncertainty, and unease. However, those memories were quickly replaced by a deep sense of gratitude and an awareness of the power of the love of my Higher Power and his protection and guidance. I am a grateful alcoholic and have been sober since 2015. I have always tried to give back by doing service. I have a sponsor and a sponsee, and before the pandemic, I belonged to two different in-person groups I called home. I attended a fair number of other meetings in-person, and have always cherished the community of this beautiful fellowship.

In March of 2020, as the virus took hold of our community, all normal life seemed to be placed on hold. Looking back in my journal entries for those days, I realize now how naïve I was at the time. I am a yoga instructor, and was teaching at a local fitness and tennis club, and one of my entries tells of the club being closed "for a couple of weeks." I wrote that my grandchildren were going to be home-schooled for a week (they never went back to school for the rest of the school year), and our church ended in-person services. There were no in-person AA meetings in my area. My husband and I were both stricken with the virus in early April, but although we were quite ill, we did not have to go to the hospital, and thankfully managed to recuperate at home.

In the Foreword to the Fourth Edition of the Big Book, written in 2001, it talks about the "sweeping changes in society ....reflected in new customs and practices within the Fellowship."

Taking advantage of technological advances, for example, A.A. members with computers can participate in meetings online, sharing with fellow alcoholics across the country or around the world." Within a week or so of the onset of the pandemic and the many closings taking place, a small group of alcoholics in my community from a couple of different groups started to meet together online on Zoom. Initially, we started to meet a couple of nights a week, but that schedule quickly changed to meetings every night of the week at 6:30 p.m. Each night's meeting was a different format: readings and discussions, 11th Step meditation, Big Book meetings, beginners meetings with speakers, and Step meetings. As word spread, our



attendance grew, and we realized we needed a core group to host meetings, and a structured format. We initially called ourselves the "Terryville et al Group", but soon changed that to "Welcome As You Are," joking that you could come to our meetings in your pajamas. Our circle grew, and as people from out of state began to join us, and we added our meetings to the SIA website.

We met every single night of the week for almost two years. In 2022, with so many people beginning to return to in-person, we changed our schedule to three nights a week, Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays. A very devoted small group has continued to chair these meetings, even though attendance is small. While most of us were unfamiliar with Zoom and online meetings, we quickly adapted and became used to manipulating the platform. We have seen miracles happen online. I have attended Zoom meetings, workshops and retreats far and wide that I would never have had the opportunity to do in-person. I have met amazing, strong sober men and women from all over the country and the world. I have personally seen people get sober online, and the miraculous power of A.A. change lives.

So my heart is, indeed, brimming with gratitude and overflowing with love. I am so thankful -for my sobriety, for my connection with a God who loves me unconditionally, for the 12 Steps
that have changed my life, for this amazing fellowship and community, and for the serenity,
courage and wisdom I've gained. I am a very grateful alcoholic.
